a steady income with education allows apprentices to actively participate in the very economy they help build. "It is our goal to expand access to good paying jobs through our program and create a pipeline to success attainable for everyone," stated Aczon.

HCATF shared this goal and promoted awareness about its programs during a virtual event hosted by the Workforce Development Division (WDD) of Hawaii's Department of Labor and Industrial Relations (DLIR). Participants from across the stategathered to witness industry innovation, explore workplace solutions, and identify opportunities for partnerships. This year, a mix of organizations, agencies, employers, and non-profits participated, with over 200 audience members present during throughout the week.

During the week, HCATF turned the spotlight on all three of its trades - carpentry, drywall, and millwright work – emphasizing how critical skills developed in these programs will be instrumental in addressing pressing workforce challenges such as supporting Hawaii's clean energy initiatives. Long-time instructor Harold Calventas gave an insight into the day-to-day life of a drywall apprentice explaining the importance of learning fundamentals through the program, allowing apprentices to become experts in their crafts. Calventas went on to explain, "With this trade, you can support your family. That's a very big benefit to doing this – taking care of your ohana, your keiki, it really helps."

HCATF also showcased its new training center in a live tour hosted by Training Coordinators April Acquavella and Darrell Seto. The new facility is instrumental in providing leading technology and tools for all HCATF's programs, but especially for millwright training: it's the first venue of its kind on-island equipped to train millwrights locally.

Last but not least, HCATF shared its community impact stemming from special training and work opportunities it provides for the best and brightest across Hawaii. From the promising high school students who participated in its third annual Career Connections Summer Internship Program, to the inaugural class of resilient individuals switching careers in the Carpentry Pre-Apprenticeship Program, HCATF creates a foundation that ensures people of all ages have access to good paying jobs in construction.

The impact of HCATF programs – and apprenticeships in general - extends even further: programs such as these support

underserved communities, advance racial equity, and help bridge the gender gap in trades work. NAW 2021 marked the first National Women in Apprenticeship Day officially designated for November 18th. Vice President Kamala Harris shared a special message in honor of the new celebration.

"Apprenticeships expand pathways for workers to enter and lead in all industries. Apprenticeships expand pathways for workers to design their lives and determine their futures," stated Harris. "Every worker in America who wants that opportunity must have that opportunity, and that means women and men alike."

From helping Hawaii becoming more sustainable environmentally and economically to creating a more equitable playing field for all, HCATF is proud to create a lasting legacy by developing and keeping talent local, while giving all our apprentices a chance to thrive in the community they call home.

A series of statutes and regulations known as The Hawaii Clean Energy Initiative (HCRI) were put into place in 2008 to serve as the framework for reaching these goals. In 2014, HCEI renewed Hawaii's commitment to clean energy, striving to reach 100 percent clean energy by 2045.

These bold goals mean clean energy projects are on the rise across the state including solar, wind, biomass, biofuels, ocean energy, and other renewable sources rich in our islands. As Hawaii prepares for more clean energy projects, HCATF is prepared to meet the workforce needs and training to help reach achieve energy independence and sustainability across our islands.

proudly completed This summer, we construction on a new, larger training facility in Kapolei. The state-of-the-art facility is the first Hawaii-based millwright training center and is the hub of our millwright apprenticeship program. Millwrights install, maintain, diagnose, and repair equipment utilized in alternative energy power plants, as well as distributors, airports, food processing, and other areas. Their specialized skillset is vital to for Hawaii's clean energy construction sector.

Hawaii's future with clean energy not only will have a positive, environmental impact on the beautiful islands we call home, it will also open the door for innovation, and create employment opportunities, especially in the trades. The apprenticeship program provides proper training and a clear pathway for members to earn a living wage in a sector that will only continue to grow as we keep moving toward the state's laudable 100 percent clean energy goal.

### TAKE NOTE

### **UH HEALTH RECORD REQUIREMENTS**

The University of Hawaii System has added the COVID-19 vaccination to its student health clearance requirements. To be on any UH campus, students – including apprentices - must be fully vaccinated against COVID-19. The weekly testing option currently being offered will be phased out by January 3, 2022.

"It is clear that a vaccinated campus is a safer campus for everyone, and a fully vaccinated student community enables the best opportunity for a healthy return to high-quality face-to-face teaching, learning and research," said UH President David Lassner.

UBC General President Douglas J. McCarron made similar observations for all tradesmen and women, stating that, "All of our jobsites have safety requirements - hard hats, specific PPE or background checks. This is no different. This is a safety requirement so that all of us can work together and go home safe at the end of the day."

To register on time for the upcoming semester, make sure plan ahead to complete the new vaccination requirement. In the meantime, please continue to follow all safety guidelines in place including using the daily health check-in app LumiSight UH, wearing a face covering, practicing safe physical distancing and washing hands regularly while on campus, or at the HCATF Training Centers .
