Third Class Completes Career Connections Internships

Fifteen high school students completed their Career Connections internships this summer, representing the third class of graduates and the growing success of this partnership between the Hawaii Carpenters Apprenticeship & Training Fund and Hawaii Department of Education. Career Connections is a work-study curriculum developed by the United Brotherhood of Carpenters' International Training Center.

The credited course is offered at over 28 public schools statewide. Students have classroom learning and hands-on experience. During the summer of their junior or senior years, they have the opportunity to apply to an optional summer internship. Students who earn certificates through the program are granted direct entry to the apprenticeship program.

At the interns' completion ceremony held July 28, HCATF training coordinator April Acquavella praised the schoolteachers for their contributions during a pandemic-stricken year: "With dedication, long hours, and a dose of creativity, they worked tirelessly to serve students."

Message from the Director

August represented a major milestone for the Hawaii Carpenters Apprenticeship & Training Fund as our program took a giant leap forward.

First, we officially opened our new Kapolei Training Center, adjacent to our existing facility. The 46,000-square foot building, which took a year to construct, will enable us to accommodate more apprentices and journey workers with classroom and hands-on training and provide a home for our millwright program.

Second, we've hired a new training coordinator to support the millwright endeavor. We introduced this apprenticeship program to meet growing industry demands for skilled professionals able to install, maintain, and repair power equipment of all varieties. This 8,000hour apprenticeship, which mirrors our carpentry and drywall programs in duration, will create exciting career opportunities for generations of local tradespeople. You'll be hearing more about this in the months to come.

On a somber note, I need to remind our apprentices, as well as your family and friends, to get vaccinated. The rapid spread of the COVID-19 Delta variant is overtaxing our medical facilities, prompted government to resume tight restrictions on gatherings and other social and business interactions, and generated concern about our ability to fight this deadly virus.

You need to get vaccinated to protect not only your loved ones, but your fellow apprentices, co-workers, and everyone with whom you interact. It's a responsibility that has far-reaching consequences and we urge you to put yourself in a safe place.

She added, "I want to thank all of our signatory contractors: the owners, superintendents, human resources professionals, foremen, and journeymen who took the time and patience to guide, nurture, and inspire our summer interns to envision a successful life beyond high school. Skilled tradesworkers are so essential to Hawaii, and the future of the trades hinges upon recruiting the best and the brightest. If these interns are any indication of what the future holds; I would say that the future's looking really good."

Students applied for the summer internships in February and faced a rigorous application process that included teacher recommendations, video interviews, and final selection by a selection committee. Selected interns were certified in OSHA and First Aid/CPR before being placed with contractors at jobsites on Oahu, Maui, and Kauai.

Intern Mason Chung of Mililani High School delivered a graduation speech on behalf of his fellow interns at the ceremony. Chung said, "Not too many kids our age would sacrifice our summers to wake up at 3, 4, or 5 o'clock every morning to go straight to work. Many people think teenagers are lazy but we're here to prove them wrong. I never said 'no' to doing something new or learning something new. We all know how to work. This career is not for the faint-of-heart, but I know each of us has what it takes to make it."

Chung advised the interns, "Don't be stagnant, mentally or physically. Don't stop moving. Always occupy yourself, asking the foreman what to do next. Don't be scared, ask your questions, learn as much as you can. You'll make it, I promise." Chung was among two interns who have been hired by their summer employers and is one of seven interns to be automatically admitted to the apprenticeship program.

The students' supervisors were effusive in their praise of the young people. Nan superintendent Doug Sylva said of his intern, "[Andrei Louis Marcos] was eager to learn anything I showed him, always going beyond the task at hand. I see really great things for him. I'm so proud of him."

Roy Shioi of Shioi Construction said of Nahj Naeole and Jonathan Workman: "Nahj worked well. He was always on time, had a good attitude, and hustled, which is what we need in our industry. Jonathan showed up early, had a good work ethic, did what he was told, followed directions, and enjoyed what he did. Both these guys will do well and any company would hire them."

HCATF Opens New Training Center in Kapolei

The Hawaii Carpenters Apprenticeship & Training Fund unveiled its new 46,000-square-foot training facility at Kapolei Business Park on August 5.

The \$16-million building, adjacent to HCATF's existing training center on Lauwiliwili Street, was established to bring leading-edge technology to the apprentices' training to increase efficiency and the quality of the work in the building industry.

Construction began in May 2020 and was completed in July. Avalon Development was the developer, Ushijima Architects the designer, and Ralph S. Inouye, Ltd. the contractor.

Present at a brief ceremony marking the occasion were HCATF Executive Director Edmund C. Aczon, Ron Taketa, co-chair of the HCATF board of trustees and executive secretary-treasurer of the Hawaii Regional Council of Carpenters, and Conrad Murashige, the other co-chair of the board and chairman of Shioi Construction. Kahu Kordell Kekoa performed the blessing and Christine Camp of Avalon was master of ceremonies.

HCATF Executive Director Edmund C. Aczon said, "With so many technological advancements in construction equipment and methodologies, HCATF has taken the necessary steps to ensure that we have the means and facilities to produce highly trained union members who will strengthen the quality and efficiency of our industry."

Aczon acknowledged the "leadership and commitment" of HCATF's labor and management trustees,

the contractors who offer the on-the-job training opportunities, Workforce Development Division of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, and Camp and her Avalon team.

Taketa said, "The fund trustees have made a significant commitment to invest in the development and training of our workforce, which in line with unionized contractors' commitment to quality in Hawaii."

The facility will enable HCATF to increase its capacity for apprenticeships and vary the training of its young men and women. Currently, it has been averaging a little more than 400 recruits annually in carpentry and drywall but expects to expand enrollment with this new facility.

HCATF also has begun a new program for millwright workers, and the new facility will be key in providing the space and resources needed for that training. Millwrights install, maintain, and repair compressors, pumps, conveyors, turbines, monorails, and other complex equipment in such industries as automotive, aerospace, energy, food processing, and pharmaceuticals. The United Brotherhood of Carpenters and The Carpenters International Training Fund operate 200 millwright training facilities employing 4,500 full- and part-time instructors.

Aczon noted, "Hawaii has been experiencing a boom in construction for the past decade, with no end in sight. The construction industry plays a key role in the state's overall economic viability, being widely considered as the second pillar behind only tourism was a private sector economic engine."

WORK RESOURCES: The job call service is in operation. Call (808) 847-5761, x9 to check your status.

EMPLOYMENT: Employers will establish and enforce their own pandemic response policies. Contact your employer directly to discuss specific rules or actions in place, and whether work schedules will continue as planned.

Pfizer Vaccine Gets Full FDA Approval

Amidst skyrocketing COVID cases—including in Hawaii—the U.S. Food and Drug Administration granted full approval to Pfizer's COVID-19 vaccine on August 23. Up until now, the Pfizer, Moderna, and Johnson & Johnson vaccines have been administered under federal emergency provisions.

The Pfizer vaccine now carries the strongest endorsement of the FDA, attesting to the drug's safety. Moderna and John & Johnson are pursuing full approval of their vaccines as well.

This news should boost public confidence in the shots and spur more organizations to require vaccinations. The Pentagon has already announced it will require all armed forces members to get vaccinated.


